I recently had the privilege of teaching a group of young teachers in Myanmar. We had been exploring the question of why we do not have more thankfulness to God in our classrooms. We do not tend to thank Him routinely for our subjects as subjects. We do not tend to routinely thank Him for the ability to 'do' these subjects. And we do not tend to routinely thank Him for learning to serve others with these subjects.

Two young teachers came up with a phrase to explain this. Their comment was that we are too used to teaching independent of God. That is genuine insight. They had discerned the gap between the words of their faith, and their teaching practice.

This encouraged the whole group to explore how we can bring a heart level response to God into our teaching, as something *tucked in* rather than *tacked on*.

In the final quote from Rodney Stark in this series, he sums up how our spiritual understanding has an impact on our theology – and this theological understanding then has an impact on how we live:

Theology necessitates an image of God (one God, not many gods) as a conscious, rational, supernatural being of unlimited power and scope. That is why there are not theologians in the East... [160]... it is also necessary to think it is legitimate to apply human reason to questions about God. That is why there are no Muslim theologians. [161]

May we never confuse knowing about God, with knowing God, as we invite our staff, students and parents into reconciled and deepening relationship with Him, through Jesus Christ. Christmas is a wonderful place to take this journey even more deeply in our Christian communities.
