Number 1:

Was the Fall of Rome a Good Thing?



What do you think your history teachers would make of this statement?

Rather than a great tragedy, the fall of Rome was the single most beneficial event in the rise of Western civilization. The many stultifying centuries of Roman rule saw only two significant instances of progress: the invention of concrete and the rise of Christianity, the latter taking place despite Roman attempts to prevent it. (p.3)

I know that my introduction to Roman society at school and university was how clever the people were and how much we owed them. This reassessment by Rodney Stark is because he takes a longer lens when he is reviewing who contributed what to this dynamic we call *human progress*. Concrete was

certainly important. Yet, foundationally, Christianity was much more important. Rome, of course, through its leadership, tried to essentially stop Christianity. Some people in our day would like to stop Christians as well (or at least make them keep their faith at home and in the local church).

But as Stark notes in a different work (The Rise of Christianity):

.... Christianity revitalised life in Greco-Roman cities by providing new norms and new kinds of social relationships able to cope with many urgent urban problems. (p.161)

Let us pray that our schools may be places of learning, serving and leading that also help revitalize our people in our society!


