A poem by Athalia Bond is reflective of many young people who are seeking to construct their own meaning – '*we are a fractured people living lives of many strands, pick a path, pick a story, the life you want is on demand …. We are a*

broken people set forth upon shifting seas ... drowning in our own fantasies.'

Facebook and Instagram have become mirrors to see if students receive "likes" for the image they present. They are trying to define themselves horizontally. But into this God's Word speaks life-changing truth. "*Let us make man in our image, our likeness… So God created man in his own image; male and female He created them.*" (Genesis 1:26, 27)

What a profound truth about our lives and our students. Imago Dei, the image of God, is the unique imprint God placed upon humanity, identifying people as a special creation. We are defined vertically in relation to our Creator and this means every person has intrinsic worth and dignity. From this truth flows a definition of human experience, God made human beings from "the adamah" the ground (Genesis 2:7) and we are *embodied souls* (CS Lewis), whole people designed to live God-glorifying lives in our bodies. Like God, we are personal and relational and intended to relate to everything personally. We are intended to worship and love God with our whole life and experience His likeness in all aspects of our humanity. All our relationships are to be characterised by love in the same way the Father, Son and Holy Spirit love one another. God's truth is the moral framework that shapes what love looks like in the reality of life. We also recognise that like ourselves, our students are born fallen image bearers who seek to run their lives independently from God. Without God's grace, in Christ, our heart orientation is to live for self. Through the Gospel work of Jesus, God is restoring His good creation and invites our students to be part of this great reclamation project. The orientation of the learner's heart will shape and give direction to their lives and response to what they learn.

At the heart of effective education is the need to nurture each student as created uniquely in the image of God and gifted to serve others. The school community, though imperfect, is to be a foretaste of the new humanity and encourage each student to become this kind of person. We are to assist our students to make a life, not just a living.

- How do we assist our students to accept their identity as a God-given gift and explore what it means to live that out? (rather than construct their own identity)
- How do we engage their hearts and minds with the truth of God's Word as the moral framework for their lives?
- Do we discern the fears and disordered passions that are in the students' hearts?
- Do we appreciate the confusing emotions amidst the competing voices

around them that conflict with God's Word?


