
Welcome to Care Conversations

## REFLECTION BY BRIAN COX

I continue to spend some time with Leaders of Biblical Christian Schools in Indonesia. This year the theme across their schools has been "Truly Yours".

Teachers, leaders, staff, students and families have sought to understand what this means, and whether it changes how we live our lives.

To understand this theme fully, we need to keep going back to the Bible in order to understand how God says to His people "I am Truly Yours"; and how His people might say to God "I am Truly Yours".

The Biblical narrative expresses clearly the nature of God-initiated covenant. Firstly, let's remind ourselves as to why God chose the nation of Israel to be "a people holy to the Lord".

This was the nation that God delivered out of Egyptian slavery, the nation God brought to the land of Canaan, and the nation through whom would come Jesus, the Messiah. Was there something special about these people that made them more attractive to God? Did they somehow deserve God's favour?

As we know, the answer to that question is "No". Deuteronomy makes it clear that Israel was to be holy to the Lord, (that is "set apart" to God) by His sovereign choice alone. There was nothing about Israel that caused them to be deserving of such a choice.

This is God's covenant story throughout the whole of Scripture. Covenant is not a conditional agreement; it is a clear sovereign choice.

John Piper spent years of his life coming to terms with God's sovereign control over the universe and everyone in it. He desperately wanted to believe that his own will was the most important factor in his relationship with Christ. After many concentrated months of studying Romans 9, he concluded that God said to him:

"I will not simply be analysed; I will be adored. I will not simply be pondered; I will be proclaimed. My sovereignty is not simply to be scrutinized; it is to be heralded. It is not grist for the mill of controversy; it is gospel for sinners who know that their only hope is the sovereign triumph of God's grace over their rebellious will."

The New Testament is full of this truth. Ephesians 1 tells us clearly that God chose His people "before the foundation of the world" – that is stunning! But what it shows us is that our behaviour and actions did not cause God to choose us.

Paul, writing to the Colossians, makes it abundantly clear that if we were to be judged simply on our own thinking and actions, we would be both unqualified and disqualified. Paul rejoices that the Father has "qualified us". "He has delivered us from the domain of darkness and transferred us to the Kingdom of His beloved Son, in whom we HAVE redemption!".

Therefore, we can rejoice in the truth that when we are the people of God, we can say to Him, "We are Truly Yours" – because He initiates the relationship and eternally sustains it.

So, what does this mean for our relationship with students? What does it mean for our school communities?

Here is another truth. The way that we relate to other people reflects the way that we think God relates to us. Our responsibility in community is to reflect our understanding of God's relationship with us into the life of the community.


Thus, because we are secure in our relationship with God, because we hear Him say to us "I am truly yours, and you are truly Mine", that is the security we must reflect to our students.

It will mean that we will love and nurture our students as people who have been brought to our community by God's sovereign will. We must communicate to our students that they are "truly ours"; that we are committed to love them and help them to grow in every good way.

Blessings as you develop covenant relationship in your school community.

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
